
It's personal. My niece, Ashley Rickner, took Humira for Eczema. You all know the long list of side effects which includes cancer.

Diagnosed May 30, 2013 with acute lymphoblastic leukemia —a type of cancer of the blood and bone marrow — the spongy tissue inside bones where blood cells are made.

Dead June 7, 2014
This after a full court press (most days in hospitals) of all that modern medicine had to offer in New Orleans then months in Houston at MD Anderson where she died in the ICU of liver failure.

She was 31.





Americans' appetite for legal drugs is close to insatiable. 4.5 billion prescriptions are filled each year in the US.



Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder gets drugs for kids and more time to take a test.



Healthcare has lost its soul...all business all of the time.


The MIC (Medical Industrial Complex) is about the health of the industry not the health of all Americans.

Disease societies thrive on Big Pharma. Both want us taking drugs not healed.

Big Pharma believes there's always a fix where benefits outweigh the risks.

We have medicalized behavior (i.e. alcoholism/obesity) and We have medicalized the natural aging process

We are increasingly being urged to take medicine for conditions that here-to-fore were not labeled diseases. For example, osteopenia (low bone mass), over-active bladder, sarcopenia (low muscle mass), pre-hypertension, pre-diabetes, and "borderline-high risk" cholesterol.



2. How should we think about the ads and all that modern medicine has to offer?

Bring healthy skepticism and serious curiosity to medical advice that will have a major impact on your life! Ask questions!

"Don't be so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out. Readily recognize what he wants from you, and quickly respond to it. Unlike the culture around you, always dragging you down to its level of immaturity God brings the best out of you, develops well-formed maturity in you."

Too many of us are sleep walking in our post-modern, post-Christian, hyper-medicalized world saying yes to what others say yes to and trying to go along to get along.

Example: Everyone needs an annual checkup. Who says? Everyone says, it's common sense!

One primary care physician friend of mine disagrees.

Video clip from FAQs: Why wouldn't I want everything medicine has to offer?

My answer?

Some things are worse than death.

My friend Ron learned and lived the side effects of what doctors gave him... extreme fatigue, belly fat, joint and muscle pain, muscles turned to flab, which affected his balance, instability in walking and standing, sleeplessness, depression, anxiety, cognitive damage and more.



I spent time with him after he had fired his oncologist.
He was only seeing a NP for pain. Never gained back the muscle lost due to treatment.

Ron was a best-selling author and one of my amazing mentors through four decades who taught me even through his serious illness and death. He said, make sure you keep telling people, "Doctors don't have to live with what they do to us."


Looking back, the oncologist was totally focused on doing his treatment; where Ron was focused on enjoying his life, even if it meant fewer years.





- We have a low or confused view of God's providence.


"The 'theology' of medicine does not believe in your soul."

Spirituality and Medicine


Hospitals rose up within spiritual communities in the Middle Ages (AD 476-1550)
Bodily Care Centered on Spiritual Care (Sometimes diseases were attributed to sin.)


The oldest known icon of Christ Pantocrator—Ruler of the Universe. 6th-century

Spirituality and Medicine

- Growth of sciences
- Dualism argued by Descarte, 1596-1650, to mean that mind and body are completely different from one another and each could exist by itself.






Spirituality and Medicine

Enlightenment to Post Modernism, 1700-present

- Growth of materialism and reductionism
- Empirical method is the primary source of truth for humanity
- Medicine grows in material focus

We began the tossing out of our faith in faith in the late 1600s, when Isaac Newton, 1642-1726, invented calculus and then took his newfound notions of infinity and applied them to space and time. Page 33

What trappings and decorum?

Dr. Butler writes that we know these things are true about modern medicine:

- 1. It creates an illusion that it knows all and can fix all.
- 2. It is used to halt/stop/interrupt how nature afflicts the body.
- 3. Effort to extend life seems to leave no space for accepting death.
- 4. Good intentions can result in the slow collapse of one organ system after another.
- 5. The culture of American medicine is focused mainly on saving life or extending life.
- 6. Physicians are trained to keep us alive no matter what that life looks like.
- 7. It is harder for physicians to step back and let nature take its course than to keep on with the next treatment.
- 8. Physicians default to deliver aggressive treatments.
- 9. The ICU literally takes our voice away; it inserts a tube to support mechanical ventilation obstructing vocal cords.
- 10. Medical technology can transmute death from a finite event into a prolonged and painful process.
- 11. This technology inflicts suffering.
- 12. Those who depend upon faith to guide their decisions seek more aggressive care at the end of life than do others.

Note: God's Word does not require us to lengthen our dying.

Too much faith in science/modern medicine means what? We will learn it means unnecessary suffering.

However...

Research shows that Christians put too much trust in physicians who mostly ignore spiritual care.

Religious Coping and Behavioral Disengagement: Opposing Influences on Advance Care Planning and Receipt of Intensive Care Near Death

Our findings here and in our prior report suggest that positive religious coping influences decisions to undergo ineffective (i.e., not curative), yet physically burdensome, medical procedures that still result in death...Positive religious coping, with its commitment to the belief that **God is in control of one's life, leads to what EOL experts consider negative outcomes**, i.e., less advance care planning and more aggressive, non-curative, burdensome EOL care. Conversely, behavioral disengagement, with its implicit acceptance that death is impending and inevitable, leads to what EOL experts consider positive outcomes, i.e., more advance care planning and less aggressive, EOL care.

These results suggest that relying upon religion to cope with terminal cancer may contribute to receiving aggressive medical care near death....religious cancer patients were less likely to understand the definition of a DNR order and were more likely to think a DNR order was morally wrong.

Intrinsic to positive religious coping is the idea of collaborating with God to overcome illness and positive transformation through suffering. Sensing a religious purpose to suffering may enable patients to endure more invasive and painful therapy at the EOL. Alternatively, religious copers might feel they are abandoning a spiritual calling as they transition from "fighting cancer" to accepting the limitations of medicine and preparing for death. **Religious patients might thus equate palliative care to "giving up on God [before he has] given up on them."** Qualitative studies commonly report spiritual reasons for preferring life-sustaining treatments, including a belief that only God knows a patient's time to die. Finally, high rates of intensive EOL care among religious copers may be attributable to religiously-informed moral positions that place high value on prolonging life....

Patients with unrealistically optimistic expectations of survival prefer and receive more aggressive EOL care.

Do we conflate our pro-life position with pro-medicine?

When clinicians engage in spiritual care seriously ill patients receive more days with Hospice care, fewer aggressive interventions and die less often in the ICU.

When spiritual support comes from religious communities there is less Hospice care, more aggressive interventions and more deaths in the ICU.



Dr. Willard died in 2013 at the age of 77 a few months after announcing publicly that he had stage four cancer.

10. If we are theists, not naturalists, or if we are Christian and not agnostic, what is Jesus saying when he tells the devil, "Man does not live by bread alone"?

Not one physical thing can give me all I need.

Matthew 4:4. Jesus had been fasting for forty days, and the devil himself shows up and tells Jesus to turn the stones into bread. Famously, "Jesus told him,

Bread = A busy schedule. A temporary sense of self-importance.

What else should we add to the list? How did we get to where Jesus is last not first? 12. Jesus said,
"The Kingdom of heaven is at hand."
What does this mean?

13. What does this mean to you and how could this change your view of sickness?

God is in me, with me, for me.

Sickness is part of our broken world but will never be the end of my story.

How do we swim upstream in our secular soup day in and day out?

History shows the march toward secularism.

Let's go back to Newton and the change that happened when science took over defining our lives. When there were so few explanations of how things work, we depended upon God to direct, inspire, and provide. Now we simply don't need God until we get to the end of our rope—or in the case of this study, the end of modern medicine.

We have to seek God, because God wants us to want him. He wants us, loves us, sees our potential but he will not force himself on us. If he took away our free will, he would be taking away what makes us in his image. His Spirit, put in us by God himself, has to rise up and take over. We have to ask it to move us, lead us, coach us, comfort us, teach us. This is the Spirit Isaac Newton killed off, kicking the door open for the scientists to rule the world, thereby paving the way for the gods of medicine to grab hold of our hearts.

14. Do we find the Kingdom of God in modern medicine?

Can't remove God from science. God is science. Everything good, including modern medicine, comes from God.

We cannot depend upon, or expect modern medicine alone, to save us from the heartache of this life and the diseases we've piled upon ourselves since creation. At the same time, God is medicine.



Hospitals have been called the modern equivalent of Renaissance cathedrals, which were important commercial centers as well as places of solace and hope in the face of death. That would make Johns Hopkins the Vatican of hospitals.


How do we know that this is true?

All of us will experience the falling away of our physicality no matter what we do or what we agree to have done to us. Better to focus on our spiritual health.


18. What advice does Tim Keller give us for dealing with our addiction to this life and all that modern medicine has to offer?




